"Pitches" Poster Session: This session is ideal for special topic items such as interesting macro analysis applications, unique assignments and projects for students, innovative teaching techniques, or student presentations. "Pitches" session presentations are fifteen minutes in length with five minutes for questions. Please submit a short abstract (150–250 words) describing the poster content and format. Submit online abstracts to Jamie Henke, MACRO Chair at <jamie.henke@wisc.edu>. DEADLINE: March 10, 2018.

Favorites session! Anyone attending the workshop is invited to submit a favorite teaching piece for our Teacher's Pets session. Please submit the name of the piece, and a short paragraph (150–250 words) describing how you use this piece in your music theory class. DEADLINE: April 1, 2018.

Evaluation of All Submissions

Submissions will be evaluated based on the description and presentation of the session in the abstract. While we welcome topics on all aspects of music, we encourage those proposals with a discernable link between the topic and macro analysis. Session topics that involve any active participation of the workshop audience are also encouraged.
